LAUDATO SI-ON THE CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME

An Encyclical published by His Holiness Pope Francis in 2015 Pope Francis writes about: The Need to Protect Employment

"Any approach to an integral ecology, which by definition does

not exclude human beings, needs to take account of the value of labour. We need to remember that men and women have the capacity to improve their lot, to further their moral growth and to develop their spiritual endowments. Work should be the setting for this rich growth, where many aspects of life enter into play: creativity, planning for the future, developing our talents, living out our values, relating to others, giving glory to God. It follows that, in the reality of today's global society, it is essential that we continue to prioritize the goal of access to steady employment for everyone, no matter the limited interests of business and dubious economic reasoning."

"We were created with a vocation to work. The goal should not be that technological progress increasingly replace human work, for this would be detrimental to humanity. Work is a necessity, part of the meaning of life on this earth, a path to growth, human development and personal fulfillment. Yet the orientation of the economy has favoured a kind of technological progress in which the costs of production are reduced by laying off workers and replacing them with machines. The loss of jobs has a negative impact on the economy. In other words, human costs always include economic costs and economic dysfunctions always involve human costs. To stop investing in people in order to gain greater short-term financial gain, is bad business for society."

The Jesuit Forum on Social Faith and Justice provides the following insights:

"Another danger that worries Pope Francis a great deal is the issue of what will happen to human work -and everyone's right to work – if we keep allowing the technological paradigm to limitlessly replace human work with machines in order to make more profit. The future of work, in a world where technology increasingly replaces jobs by automation and robots of various kinds, is a challenge that has almost everyone worried. The problem often hits families as it is much harder for younger people (ages15-24) to get a good start in the working world than it used to be. That's easily understood when we consider that youth unemployment in Ontario ranges from 17-20%. In

Europe, Greece has 52% and Spain has 53% youth unemployment and in Africa rates are explosive with countries like Kenya having a rate of 67% youth unemployment."

Comment: Keep in mind that technological change is driven by rich corporations who continue to take steps to increase income and reduce costs. There is no hesitation on their part to reduce human jobs to increase their profit. Consider the issue with basic income in Ontario. Remember the negative response from businesses with the basic hourly income went to \$14.00? Consider the technology that already exists that is ready to eliminate millions of jobs. Self-driven vehicles will replace taxi drivers, transport drivers, bus drivers, etc. Companies already are developing the use of drones to make home deliveries so there go millions of jobs in the delivery business. Many local businesses already installed self-check-outs that will eliminate many cashier jobs. The list goes on! Each one of us can do something – refuse to use those technologies and support human jobs.
