LAUDATO SI – ON THE CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME

An Encyclical published by His Holiness Pope Francis in 2015 Water is a human right and should not be a commodity to

be bottled and sold for profit!

"Access to safe drinkable water is a basic and universal human right, since it is essential to human survival and, as such, is a condition for the exercise of other human rights. Our world has a grave social debt towards the poor who lack access to drinking water, because they are denied the right to a life consistent with their inalienable dignity. This debt can be paid partly by an increase in funding to provide clean water and sanitary services among the poor. But water continues to be wasted, not only in the developing world but also in developed countries which possess it in abundance. An acute water shortage may occur within a few decades unless urgent action is taken. The environmental repercussions could affect billions of people; it is also conceivable that the control of water by large multinational businesses may become a major source of conflict in this century."

"The deterioration of the environment and of society affects the most vulnerable people on the planet: Both experience and scientific research show that the gravest effects of all attacks on the environment are suffered by the poorest. The depletion of fishing reserves especially hurts small fishing communities without the means to replace those resources; water pollution particularly affects the poor who cannot buy bottled water; and rises in the sea level mainly affect impoverished coastal populations who have nowhere else to go."

Comment: Canada, one of the smallest countries by population, possesses 10% of all fresh-water resources in the world. As a country, our federal, provincial and municipal governments have failed the people of Canada by allowing the pollution of our water ways. Our governments have allowed our industries, especially the oil and gas companies and chemical companies to totally disregard the importance and value of water to our people. Thus, it is important as individuals to become aware of what has happened over the decades so that we can become advocates for our water resources to belong to the people. In the 1960's our provincial government allowed a chemical company to discharge about 9,000 kg of mercury into

the Wabigoon-English water system. This mercury contaminated the fish, thus taking away the livelihood of many indigenous people as well as poisoning First Nations communities causing serious health issues and death. Our provincial and federal governments have yet to correct this injustice.

All Canadians by now know about the destruction of the environment in the Alberta tar sands. The process of extracting oil necessitates the use of billions of liters of water every year. The oil companies are not buying this water, they are using it without any regard to the needs of the people who live there. The tailing ponds that result, are full of toxins. There are many examples world-wide of how mining and drilling companies destroy the environment and water sources. This is a crime against humanity. The United Nations declared at least 884 million people in the world lack access to clean water and 1.5 million children under the age of 5 die each year from waterbourne-related diseases. I call upon all of us to reflect on this topic.
