LAUDATO SI-ON THE CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME

An Encyclical published by His Holiness Pope Francis in 2015

The Principle of the Common Good! "Human ecology is inseparable from the notion of the common good, a central and unifying principle of

social ethics. The common good is "the sum of those conditions of social life which allow social groups and their individual members ready access to their own fulfillment. Underlying the principle of the common good is respect for the human person as such, endowed with basic and inalienable rights ordered to his or her integral development. It has also to do with the overall welfare of society. Outstanding among these groups is the family, as the basic cell of society. Finally, the common good calls for social peace, the stability and security provided by a certain order. The state in particular, is obliged to defend and promote the common good."

"In the present condition of global society, where injustices abound, and growing numbers of people are deprived of basic human rights and considered expendable, the principle of the common good immediately becomes a summons to solidarity and a preferential option for the poorest of our brothers and sisters. Once we start to think about the kind of world we are leaving to future generations, we look at things differently; we realize that the world is a gift which we have freely received and must share with others. It is on loan to each generation, which must then hand it on to the next."

"What kind of world do we want to leave to those who come after us, to children who are now growing up? We may well be leaving to coming generations debris, desolation and filth. The pace of consumption, waste and environmental change has so stretched the planet's capacity that our contemporary lifestyle can only precipitate catastrophes. Parents can be prone to impulsive and wasteful consumption, which then affects their children. Let us not only keep the poor of the future in mind, but also today's poor, whose life on this earth is brief and who cannot keep on waiting." Comment: The leadership in every community and

every country is entrusted with ensuring that the common good is what all people have a right to share. The welfare of all people is the obligation of each state. However, over the past many decades the groups that have most benefited are the rich companies and international corporations. This has resulted in a very

small number of people having huge riches, while the vast majority of people world-wide, suffer from poverty, oppression, lack of clean air and fresh water. Billionaires live in their palaces while millions of people die from starvation and a lack of clean air and water. This is not a just society! The earth is a gift from God for all people yet the few very wealthy, use the earthly resources to increase their wealth with no concern for injustices that their actions promote.

Pope Francis asks us what kind of world we are leaving to our children. This is the world our children are inheriting. Air that is filled with toxins, clean water that has been polluted and is not drinkable. Our waterways filled with poisons, killing aquatic life and making people sick. Our land is degraded by the mining and oil companies and the toxic residues they leave behind are not cleaned up. Plastics have contaminated land and water to the point that it has become a world-wide crisis. Yet manufacturers continue to produce billions of plastic bottles that take over 400 years to break down in our landfills. We are heading to an earth that may not be livable in a few decades yet countries allow vehicles and other toxins to pollute the air we all need to survive. Our children and grandchildren will inherit this world. Is this acceptable to you?
