.Laudato Si – On The Care For Our Common Home

An Encyclical published by His Holiness Pope Francis in 2015

An Ecological conversion!

“We must regain the conviction that we need one another, that we

have a shared responsibility for others and the world, and that being good and decent are worth it. We have had enough of immorality and the mockery of ethics, goodness, faith and honesty. It is time to acknowledge that lighthearted superficiality has done no good. When the foundations of social life are corroded, what ensues are battles over conflicting interests, new forms of violence and brutality, and obstacles to the growth of a genuine culture of care for the environment.”

“Love, overflowing with small gestures of mutual care, is also civic and political, and it makes itself felt in every action that seeks to build a better world. Love for society and commitment to the common good are outstanding expressions of a charity which affects not only relationships but also micro-relationships, social, economic and political ones. That is why the Church set before the world the ideal of a civilization of love. Social love is the key to authentic development: In order to make society more human, more worthy of the human person, love in social life – political, economic and cultural – must be given renewed value, becoming the constant and the highest norm for all activity.”

“Not everyone is called to engage directly in political life. Society is also enriched by a countless array of organizations which work to promote the common good and to defend the environment, whether natural or urban. Some, for example, show concern for a public place (a building, a fountain, an abandoned monument, a landscape, a square) and strive to protect, restore, improve or beautify it as something belonging to everyone. Thus, a community can break out of the indifference induced by consumerism. In this way, the world, and the quality of life of the poorest, are cared for, with a sense of solidarity which is at the same time aware that we live in a common home which God has entrusted to us.”

Comment: Pope Francis provides us with an important challenge. His Holiness invites all of us to be active citizens and be involved in caring for our common home. We must be willing to contact our politicians when there is an issue that hurts our environment. People have the universal right to clean air, clean water and healthy food. In our own community we have

many volunteer organizations that help those in need, those who are homeless and live in poverty. We are called to support those groups by volunteering or donating. Groups such as The Good Shepherd, St. Vincent de Paul Society, Food Banks, and many more. Pope Francis is very active in the political forum working on our behalf. This past week Pope Francis invited the world's petroleum leaders for private talks on climate change and the moral imperative to save God's creation. Many major oil company CEO's attended and issued a statement to transition to cleaner energies. The Pope attended the Friday session and told the group that "a radical energy transition to clean, low-carbon power sources was needed and that if managed well, it would generate new jobs, reduce inequality and improve the quality of life for those affected by climate change". Let us follow the Pope's example and become more active in our own communities to protect our earth!

The Hamilton Mountain Farmer's Market

The Hamilton Mountain Farmers' Market sponsored by Sacred Heart Church will run Saturdays starting May 18th until November 2019. The market is open from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. The market is a True Farmers' market where all the produce is grown or produced on local area farms and sold by the farmers themselves. It is located at the corner of Viewpoint and Mountain Park Avenues on the Sacred Heart Church parking lot, one block west of the Juravinski Hospital, on the Mountain Brow. Come out and support the farmers and enjoy the fresh seasonal produce!

Campaign coming this way

Preparations are under way at Sacred Heart Parish for the "One Heart, One Soul" Campaign, and across the diocese, early returns are promising! Through mid-May, 14 Pilot Wave parishes had raised a total of more than \$2.5 million, and an additional \$1.6 million had been pledged by other diocesan supporters and organizations. That total is about 12 percent of the campaign's \$35 million goal. The Pilot Wave will run through June, and three larger, additional waves will follow as the campaign gathers steam and continues through early 2021. Sacred Heart Parish is among more than 30 parishes and a number of mission churches taking part in the next wave. Through the summer, preparations will include forming a volunteer team, developing campaign materials and identifying projects. Kickoff Weekend is tentatively set for September. The campaign is aimed at strengthening parishes and several diocesan wide ministries.
